WORKSHOP SESSION I

1. Ethics – Establishing and Maintaining Appropriate Professional Boundaries Part 1

Mental health professionals are charged with the legal and ethical responsibility to maintain professional boundaries, but the duty isn't always so easy to discern. This course brings context to ethical concerns often experienced by professionals in practice in maintaining appropriate professional boundaries. Presenters will review common ethical dilemmas and discuss a process to make informed decisions that insulate professionals from legal liability while also protecting clients/students/patients from harm. Overview and discussion of concerns related to HIPAA/FERPA will also be provided.

2. High Stakes: The Impact of Gambling on our Youth's Mental Health and Well-Being, An Emerging Issue

Our students are facing many challenges that can have a significant impact on their mental health and overall well-being. With the increase in accessibility and availability of gambling activities, it is imperative that healthcare professionals and schools have the education and tools to reach students who may be at risk of developing a gambling problem. In this session, participants will learn about the current landscape of gambling opportunities in New York State, identify why young people are at higher risk for developing a gambling problem including the co-morbidities with other mental health and substance use issues, discuss screening resources for identifying those at risk and referral information for treatment, and ways to implement prevention strategies within their current setting.

Learning outcome: 85% of participants will be able to describe the impact of gambling on youth mental health, identify risk factors and co-occurring conditions associated with problem gambling, and apply screening and referral strategies to support at-risk students within their school setting (1.5 nursing contact hours)

Learning objectives: understand factors that can increase a young person's vulnerability to problem gambling; explore how gambling can negatively impact school performance; learn ways to implement prevention strategies (1.5 CEUs for Social Workers).

3. Empowering Student Success: Understanding the Intersection of IDEA, OHI, IHCP, and 504 Plans

In this workshop, educators and healthcare professionals will come together to explore the critical juncture between special education services and healthcare provisions for students. By working in tandem, we can ensure the holistic well-being and academic success of all students. Join us as we delve into the nuances of Individualized Education Plans (IEPs), Other Health Impairment (OHI) designations, Individualized Health Care Plans (IHCPs), and 504 Plans, understanding how each plays a vital role in supporting students with diverse needs.

Learning Outcome: 85% of participants will demonstrate increased knowledge of the special education qualification process and the development of Individualized Health Care Plans (IHCPs) to support student needs. (1.5 nursing contact hours)

Learning objectives: understand the process of qualifying for special education services; recognize the different role of each type of service/plan to support students (1.5 CEUs for Social Workers).

6. Moral Injury is Not Burn-Out: Understanding a Silent Struggle

Moral Injury (MI) occurs when our actions contradict our core moral beliefs, often leading to a deep emotional wound. For healthcare professionals and educators, this can arise from ethical dilemmas, witnessing harm, or facing situations that challenge personal values—often due to pressures like understaffing, limited resources, or systemic constraints. In this seminar, we'll explore how MI manifests in the workplace and its toll on mental and emotional wellbeing. From tough decision-making under pressure to witnessing ethical breaches, the psychological impact can be profound.

Learning outcome: 85% of learners will report an increased ability to recognize the signs and symptoms of Moral Injury and identify at least one strategy for advocating ethical safety in the workplace. (1.5 nursing contact hours)

Learning objectives: discuss how moral injury manifests in the workplace; learn strategies for identifying and addressing Moral Injury. (1.5 CEUs for Social Workers)

This presentation is a dive into the benefits and concerns surrounding service recipient care in the age of AI.

8. 911, What's Your Emergency? Navigating Medical Emergencies in Schools

Medical emergencies in school settings demand swift action, quick thinking, and seamless coordination among staff, students, and healthcare professionals. In the absence of a full medical team, school nurses play a critical role in responding to urgent situations. This seminar will explore the unique challenges faced by school nurses during medical emergencies, from managing trauma and severe allergic reactions to responding to sudden illnesses. Attendees will gain insights into how to prepare in advance, develop comprehensive emergency response plans, and execute those plans effectively when the unexpected happens. Through real-life scenarios and practical advice, we will focus on building confidence in handling medical crises, ensuring school nurses are equipped to lead and guide staff in providing the best care for students in moments of need.

Learning outcome: 85% of participants will use the information to develop a comprehensive emergency plan in the school setting. (1.5 nursing contact hour)

WORKSHOP SESSION III

9. Link to Hope (Suicide Prevention)

This seminar provides basic information on suicide, focusing on how to support individuals who may be contemplating suicide. Covering signs and behaviors that may indicate someone is contemplating suicide and how they may invite help, whether consciously or unconsciously, this seminar emphasizes the role of the helper in offering immediate, non-professional "first aid" to someone in crisis. Attendees will learn to recognize signs that someone may be struggling, how they might invite help, and how to approach them with care and compassion. The session empowers participants to confidently offer initial support and guide the individual toward seeking professional help, all while maintaining a safe and supportive presence.

Learning outcome: 85% of participants will be able to recognize signs of suicidal ideation, identify ways individuals may seek help, and apply basic intervention strategies to provide immediate support and guide individuals toward professional care. (1.0 nursing contact hour)

Learning objectives: recognize the ways in which a person thinking about suicide often invites help, either directly or indirectly; become confident in approaching and connecting with a person to ask openly and directly about suicide; how to support someone if they acknowledge that they are thinking about suicide. (1.0 CEUs for Social Workers)
