Even with their storied presence and impact on U.S. military successes, fewer than a dozen women have earned the rank of four-star general or admiral.* They include:

U.S. Army General Ann Dunwoody. On Nov. 14, 2008, Dunwoody became the first woman in U.S. military and uniformed service history to achieve a four-star officer rank.

U.S. Navy Admiral Michelle Howard. In 2014, Howard became the first **African American woman to command** a U.S. Navy ship and the first woman of any race to attain the rank of admiral. In the same year she also became the 38th Vice Chief of Naval Operations.

32nd Vice Commandant of the U.S. Coast Guard Linda Lee Fagan. In 2021, Fagan became the 32nd vice commandant of the U.S. Coast Guard and the Coast **Guard's first female four-star admiral. She served as commandant from June 2022 to January 2025.**

U.S. Air Force General Janet Wolfenbarger. Wolfenbarger is the first woman to achieve the rank of four-star general in the USAF. She was nominated in 2012.

*Women have not yet reached the four-star status in either the U.S. Marine Corps or the Space Force.
