Film Review

For unionists, social justice people, and working folks everywhere, see RUSTIN, an excellent film about Bayard Rustin, the organizer of the 1963 March on Washington. Rustin, who lived in the Chelsea neighborhood of NY in union—sponsored housing known as Penn South, worked to pull off this march despite the Black power structure being initially opposed.

He started with A. Philip Randolph, the Black elder statesman of unionism in the U.S., and eventually, with the assistance of an enthusiastic group of young folks, convinced King and the rest to get on—board and make it happen.

Rustin's homosexuality kept him mostly behind the scenes — back then that was a problem — but he succeeded despite Hoover and the FBI watching his every move.

The UAW was one of the biggest Union to supporters, and it gave lots of cash to fund buses and signs. In recognition, Walter Reuther, one of the very few whites, was given a speaking spot at the rally.

It is streaming on Netflix — so watch it. It's a major piece of American history.

The New York State United Teachers has endorsed Tom Suozzi in the Special Election for the New York 3rd Congressional District.

NYSUT President Melinda Person released the following statement in support:

"Tom Suozzi supports educators, opposes onerous standardized testing, is an advocate for community schools, and will fight to change the state and local tax cap to provide financial relief to middle-class



families. He is a strong advocate for unions and public education and will be a powerful voice for the workers, students and communities of the 3rd District in the halls of Congress."

Suozzi has expressed commitment to top NYSUT priorities this year, including increased funding to expand the community school model; tax relief for hardworking families across New York; the proposed More Teaching, Less Testing Act that would give states the option to test less frequently and use more reasonable evaluation measures; and the greater labor movement as a whole.

The special election will be held Feb. 13, 2024, to replace an expelled former congressional member.

New York State United Teachers is a statewide union with nearly 700,000 members in education, human services and health care. NYSUT is affiliated with the American Federation of Teachers, the National Education Association and the AFL-CIO.

Book Review



Suffolk Community College Professor Emeritus of English, Stephen Lewis, has published his tenth novel. Set in 17th century Puritan New England, *From Infamy to Hope* tells the story of the housemaid Rachel Moore in her own compelling voice. The story features that colony's two most powerful figures, Governor John Winthrop and his courageous opponent Anne Hutchinson. The book relates the story of the religious persecution of a servant girl made pregnant by rape. Convicted of fornication, she is sentenced to wear a black W for "whore" on her gown. Over the opposition of Hutchinson, the colony heads into war with the Pequot Indians. Rachel masquerades as a boy soldier, hoping to recover her baby who was sold to the Pequots by her alcoholic father to satisfy a debt.

She is at the war's final battle when the colonial army burns down the Pequot's fortified village in Mystic, Connecticut. Will she find her baby among the ashes?

Although Hutchinson was ultimately excommunicated and banished, a statue in her honor now stands before the State House in Boston, and a parkway bears her name in New York near where she died in another Indian war. Her descendants include F.D.R., the Bushes, as well as Mitt Romney. The present day Pequots now run Foxwood Casino near the site of the massacre in Connecticut.
