Fix Tier 6

It's been over a decade since Tier 6 became part of the New York state pension system. Since then, over 100,000 NYSUT members earn a significantly reduced pension as compared to earlier tiers. Consider this:

Tier 6 members pay 3 to 6 percent of their salaries into the pension system their entire careers—and their contributions grow with pay raises.

Tier 4 member contributions are capped at 3 percent and end after 10 years.

Tier 4 members can retire at 55 with 30 years of service.

Tier 6 members must work to age 63, up to 40 years of service, or face heavy penalties.

Tier 4 member—Retiring at 55 with 30 years, would receive 60 percent of her Final Average Salary. Can retire and collect her pension, penalty free, with 30 years of service at 55 years old.

Tier 6 member—Retiring at 55 with 30 years, would only receive 26.4 percent of his Final Average Salary—after paying tens of thousands more into the system. Can't retire and collect his pension, without facing heavy penalties, until he's 63.

Why does this matter to retirees?

Fixing Tier 6 is about keeping talented educators in the classroom and recruiting new educators into the profession. Our work was important and still is; pensions should reflect that.

How can you get involved?

We know how to get this done, but we can't do it without you. Whether you're a retiree or a Tier 4, 5 or 6 member, you can help NYSUT Fix Tier 6.
